CAI Budget Report

July 1, 2023 - June 30, 2024

CAI has separate budgets and funding sources for its two components:

- The Academic Component is paid by the USD School of Law pursuant to two
 endowments, the Price Chair in Public Interest Law and the Fellmeth-Peterson Faculty
 Chair in Child Rights, which together pay for all of CAI's academic-related personnel and
 expenses. This funding is assured annually, and is referred to as "hard money."
- The Advocacy Component is supported by funds raised externally by CAI through gifts, grants, contracts, attorney fees, awards, etc. This funding is referred to as "soft money," and CAI must raise this amount annually in order to maintain its advocacy staff and fund its advocacy efforts. Details about the 2023-24 Advocacy Component expenses and revenues are presented below.
