GENERAL TIPS FOR INTERVIEWING



OVERVIEW: GOALS



Contrast ineffective v. effective interviewing techniques



Match interview style to developmental, mental health, and psychosocial characteristics of the client

SCENARIO 1

Your client, Sam is 13 years old, and charged with a felony for bringing a knife to school. He has been waiting with an adult male caregiver in the crowded hall of the juvenile courthouse since 8 a.m. It is now 11:30 and the court has advised you the case will be called shortly. You approach Sam and the adult male caregiver and advise Sam that the court wants to call his case so you need to speak to him quickly. You take Sam to the end of the hallway and begin the interview.

SCENARIO 3 A: DISCUSSING THE CASE

• You are in the process of interviewing Alisa, a 16-year-old African American teen, who is currently detained and charged with a felony for assaulting another youth in a group home. Staff at the group home have identified the client as having Conduct Disorder—Adolescent Onset and ADHD. You have already introduced yourself and explained your role and confidentiality. You are now discussing the facts of the case. The interview is taking place on the unit, in the dayroom but in an office that is glassed in.

You have discussed the facts with Alisa – now you are discussing detention

SCENARIO 4 : FOLLOW-UP INTERVIEW IN JUVENILE HALL

• You did not get to see Alisa in juvenile hall on Tuesday. You do make it out on Friday morning. The purpose of this interview is to check in and gather collateral information for the next court date.
